The Prophet Zechariah, which means "Yahweh Remembers"

Prophet Zechariah, known for his visions and prophecies concerning the rebuilding of the Temple after exile, was a priest (grandson of Iddo), born in Babylon, who encouraged hope during a time of discouragement, famously prophesying, "Not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit" for the Temple's completion, and foretold messianic figures like "the Branch" (King & Priest). He is also noted for his detailed apocalyptic visions, including flying scrolls and a golden lampstand, and traditionally believed to have been martyred between the altar and the temple.

- **Priest-Prophet:** Zechariah was unique as both a priest (from the priestly family of Iddo) and a prophet, giving him deep insight into Temple rituals and divine mysteries.
- **Post-Exilic Context:** He prophesied to the returning exiles, encouraging them to finish the Second Temple when they had grown discouraged.
- **"Not by Might":** In his vision of the golden lampstand, an angel revealed that the Temple would be finished not by human strength but by God's Spirit (Zech 4: 6).
- **Messianic Figures:** He described the Messiah as "the Branch" (Zech 3: 8, 6: 12) and "My Shepherd" (Zech 13: 7), linking to Christ's priestly and kingly roles.
- **Apocalyptic Visions:** His book features eight vivid visions, including a flying scroll to punish sin and a measuring of Jerusalem, symbolizing future restoration.
- **Name Meaning:** His name means "The Lord remembers," reflecting his message of God remembering His people.
- **Lineage:** He was the son of Berechiah and grandson of Iddo, who returned from Babylon with Zerubbabel.
- **Martyrdom:** Jewish tradition holds that he was murdered in the Temple court, a tradition echoed in Matthew 23: 35.

Zechariah 4: 6, "So he said to me, "This is the word of the Lord to Zerubbabel: 'Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit,' says the LORD Almighty."
