The Prophet Malachi, which means "My Messenger"

Malachi was the final Old Testament prophet (450 - 432 B.C.) who bridged 400 years of silence before John the Baptist. His name means "My Messenger" and he is known for using a unique question-and-answer dialogical style to rebuke post-exilic Judah for spiritual apathy, corrupt worship and divorce.

Key facts about the prophet Malachi:

- Meaning of Name:** Malachi (Hebrew: *Mal'akhi*) means "My Messenger," which some scholars interpret as a title rather than a personal name, though it is generally considered a proper name.
- The "Seal" of the Prophets:** As the final author of the Old Testament, he is called the "seal of the prophets" by Holy Fathers.
- Historical Context:** He likely ministered in Jerusalem alongside Nehemiah, during the Persian period (432 - 425 B.C.), addressing issues like corrupt priests, intermarriage with pagans and neglect of tithes.
- Unique Literary Style:** Malachi's book is characterized by a distinctive "disputation" style, featuring a series of six dialogues where God makes a charge, the people respond with a question and God explains the charge.
- Foretelling of John the Baptist:** Malachi 3: 1 explicitly predicts a messenger who would "prepare the way" before the Lord, a prophecy that Jesus directly applied to John the Baptist.
- Theological Themes:** His message centers on God's unwavering love, the necessity of pure worship and warnings of coming judgment.
- Identity Speculation:** While little is known about his background, some Jewish traditions in the Talmud suggest Malachi might have been a pseudonym for Ezra or even Mordecai.
- Solemn Ending:** The Book of Malachi concludes with a warning of a "curse" if the people do not repent, serving as a stark ending to the Old Testament.

VERSE FOR THE WEEK

Malachi 4: 2: "But for you who fear my name, the sun of righteousness shall rise with healing in its wings..."

"WHAT'S TROUBLING YOU?"

The phrase "What's troubling you?" is a common expression used in Christian devotionals as a prompt for self-reflection and prayer.

The devotional context implies encouraging an individual to turn their anxieties, fears and problems over to God.

The general message found in these devotionals is that rather than being overwhelmed by problems, people should:

- **Pray honestly:** Tell God what is causing distress or worry, as He is not surprised by human fears.
- **Trust God's plan and timing:** Believers are encouraged to trust that even when circumstances seem impossible, God has a purpose and will work things out for their good.
- **Seek peace:** The goal is to find inner peace and rest for the soul by relying on God's power and promises, rather than trying to handle everything alone.
- **Focus on faith over fear:** The phrase is often used to remind people to choose faith and belief in God's ability to provide strength and support, even during difficult times.

Essentially, the question serves as an invitation to engage in honest conversation with God and surrender worries to a higher power for peace and guidance.
