A SHORT SUMMARY OF JAMES (SON OF ALPHAEUS), THE APOSTLE

James, the son of Alphaeus, is known as "James the Less" (or James the Lesser) to distinguish him from the other prominent apostle named James, the son of Zebedee, who is known as "James the Greater". This distinction, mentioned in the Gospels, helps identify the less prominent James, who was one of Jesus' twelve disciples, but plays a smaller role in the biblical accounts compared to his namesake. James the Less is only mentioned four times in the Bible, each time in connection with his mother, Mary, who was one of the women who went to the tomb of Jesus and found that it had been opened.

James is called the son of Alphaeus in all four New Testament lists of the Twelve. While this definitely distinguishes him from James, the son of Zebedee and James, the half-brother of Jesus, it also associates him with the better-known Matthew, who is called Levi, the son of Alphaeus (Mark 2: 14).

James (son of Alphaeus) is named in the list of Apostles in Matthew 10: 1 - 3, Mark 3: 14 - 19, Luke 6: 13 - 16, and Acts 1: 13.

The name "the Less" is used in Mark 15: 40, which refers to "Mary, the mother of James the younger and of Joseph and Salome". The Greek word for "younger" (mikros) is often translated as "Less" or "Lesser". He is mentioned less frequently in the Gospels and plays a minor role in the recorded events compared to other apostles.

Some scholars believe he was a cousin of Jesus, as Alphaeus may have been related to Jesus' mother. The father of the disciple Matthew was also named Alphaeus, leading some to suggest that James and Matthew were brothers. However, although both James, son of Alphaeus, and the publican Matthew are identified by their father's name, Alphaeus, the Bible does not state that Matthew and James the Less were brothers, even though it often lists their family connections for other apostles.

The New Testament does not provide specific accounts of James, son of Alphaeus, engaging in particular acts or teachings. His role as an apostle, however, implies that he was a witness to Jesus' ministry, death and resurrection and that he participated in the early church's mission to spread the Gospel. As an apostle, James would have been involved in the foundational work of establishing Christian communities and teaching the doctrines of the faith.
